A word from the National Chairman

Let me give everyone an update from the AGM held immediately after the Conference in Invercargill (which will be covered elsewhere).

People first:

I would like to thank the outgoing national exec members and welcome the new, incoming ones.

Special mention must go to Ian Miller, outgoing Region 5 (Otago and Southland) Representative. Ian started Taieri Shed – the first one in the South Island - 17 years ago and has been Regional Rep for the last 7 years so has well and truly "done his bit". He has always been the steady hand on the tiller in the background of the National Exec and I personally have been very grateful of his wise counsel, particularly over the last year. Most telling perhaps was that he was not happy about handing over the reins until a suitable successor came along, which he most certainly did in the form of Peter Bailey, Operations Manager of Invercargill shed and yes, conference organiser; "If you want something done, give it to a busy person!".

Roger Bowman from Waimea shed is another long serving member of the exec and has just completed his second stint as Secretary, doing a great job in some fairly challenging times. He will be succeeded by Neville Jamieson from Paeroa Shed.

Some other organisations give each other awards for the kind of service that Ian and Roger have selflessly given to Menzshed NZ but I think it's great that in our best understated Kiwi way we are not in it for awards and we can just acknowledge it with a quiet "thanks; good on yer mate!".

David Atkinson has done a great job as Treasurer and will be ably succeeded by Garry Bryant from Auckland Central and Cambridge Sheds, for whom he is already Treasurer.

Two regional rep roles which were previously vacant were filled either before or at the AGM: Brent Russell from Auckland Central Community Shed will look after Region 1 (Northland and Auckland). Nigel Young from New Brighton shed will look after Region 4 (Canterbury and West Coast). Nigel will be ably assisted by John Cook from Timaru shed and Simon Burgess Shaw and Russ Aiton - both from Mawhera Menzshed on the West Coast.

So, Region 4 has gone from a famine to a feast in terms of Regional Rep support and for the first time since I can remember we have a full roster on the National Executive.

The AGM on Sunday morning - minutes to be circulated later - was always going to be interesting, particularly in regard to the \$5 per capita motion moved by Akaroa shed and seconded by Halswell shed.

The motion – with a couple of amendments to clarify timing (it will take effect from our next membership year so from 1 Jan 2026) - was carried by a clear majority so you may see your own shed's subs increase slightly in line with that.

I explained to those present at the AGM and will repeat here that the national executive's plan going forward is to consider the opinions and requests shared in last year's member survey and based on those and our own ideas to come back to all member sheds with a proposed strategy and budget (based on the \$5 per capita) for next year; calendar 2026. This will be circulated to all sheds and feedback will be sought. We have already started this process with a planning session amongst the outgoing board and those incoming members able to join us, held immediately after the AGM on Sunday afternoon. As for the balance of 2025, for which subs remain unchanged at \$25 per shed, thanks to the generosity of the Selwyn Foundation we have the funding in place to visit sheds and hold hub meetings in pursuit of the 'deliverable' of holding a Men's Health Expo — or the next best thing — in every shed by the end of the year, plus of course whatever else we can help sheds with.

By now all sheds should have received the Men's Health Expo "how to" booklet produced by Publications Officer Richard Cato.

Please put your hand up to help with the planning and running of your own shed's health expo or event.

If you are in any doubt about their benefit then please consider that at the Men's Health Expo that ran on the sidelines of the conference in Invercargill, out of 73 people tested:

only 18 (so 25%) were either "ideal" or "normal"

41 (56%) were high and asked to monitor their BPs over time

11 (15%) were advised to visit their GP for further testing

3 (4%) were asked to see a health care provider WITHIN THE NEXT DAY

Which really begs the question: "Are you feeling lucky, punk?"

So, as I see it:

a great conference at which I feel we came of age in terms of recognising our key object of men's health a robust exchange of ideas at the AGM we are in good shape at both shed and national exec levels the national exec has a full team who are ready and keen to explore the various possibilities to grow and assist member sheds going forward.

I'll leave you with a couple of quotes I shared at the AGM which as volunteers you may find of interest:

Conference 2025 face to face

Men's health and wellbeing a key focus at 2025 MENZSHED NEW ZEALAND conference in Invercargill

MENZSHED NEW ZEALAND members were treated to true Southland hospitality during their three-day, bi-annual conference in Invercargill recently. 'Sheddies' and their wives/partners descended on the city for the event organised by the Invercargill Men's Shed, with the Kelvin Hotel providing an ideal venue.

Highlights of the conference which ran from 4 – 6 April included visits to key local sites such as the Invercargill Men's Shed (which included a demonstration by Carbatec of their "Sawstop" machine), Niagara Timber, E Hayes (home to "The World's Fastest Indian") and Fi Innovations. The wives/partners enjoyed a bus tour which included The Seriously Good Chocolate Factory and Folster Gardens where they had lunch.

A central feature of this year's gathering was the Men's Health Expo, an initiative designed to bring vital health information directly to Shed members in a welcoming, informal setting. Attendees had access to free health checks and advice from major health organisations including the Heart Foundation, Prostate Cancer Foundation, Hearing Southland, Alzheimer's Society and Diabetes NZ. The event also included presentations by Well South PHO, mental health expert Zac Kim, and retired surgeon and Southland health champion Murray Pfeifer, as well as a talk by Work and Income NZ on how they can be of assistance to seniors.

MENZSHED NEW ZEALAND has plans to expand the successful Men's Health Expo model across its national network of 136 sheds, with support from registered charity The Selwyn Foundation.

The keynote speaker after the buffet dinner on Saturday evening was the genuine Southland bloke Keith Neylon. Keith, a veteran of New Zealand's primary industries and author of A Touch of Madness, provided the evening with tales and anecdotes of his life to date.

The conference event included the MENZSHED NEW ZEALAND AGM on Sunday morning, giving members an opportunity to carry out the business of their organisation.

A lasting symbol of gratitude and love

In a heartfelt tribute to a beloved friend and community member, Megan Jeffcoat has honoured the memory of Beverley McGuire with a gift that embodies the warmth and care Beverley both gave and received in her final years.

Beverley, a very close friend of Megan's, spent her last couple of years living at Pohlen Hospital, where she became so much more than a resident. She was adored by staff and treated as one of their own. Her passing was deeply felt throughout the hospital.

Wanting to give back to Pohlen and create something lasting in Beverley's memory, Megan approached Wayne Anderson at the Matamata Men's Shed for ideas. The pair considered restoring the existing lunch table used by staff, but Wayne quickly determined it was beyond repair. Instead, he proposed something better - a brand-new table built from scratch.

With full support of the Men's Shed members, the project soon became a collaborative labour of love. "Everyone was very keen to get busy and really put their all into it," Wayne said. "It was a nice way to honour such a loved friend, but also a chance to give back to Pohlen for their outstanding care."

Matamata Timber & Hardware significantly discounted the materials which resulted in a three-way contribution between Megan, the Men's Shed, and the locally owned and operated business.

Due to its size, the table was constructed in parts and assembled on-site at the hospital's outdoor staff area. The finished piece features thoughtful design details including a Lazy Susan engraved with the words "Have a coffee with Beverley," inviting staff to pause and remember her.

Megan was overwhelmed when she saw the final result. "The design is fantastic," she said, also highlighting the separated seats that allow easy access without having to climb over them. "It was

If you can't get someone to come to the shed to give a talk, then get hold of NZ Transport Agency and have them send a box of the "Driving as a Senior" book for all the blokes.





Profiling the New Plymouth Menzshed

This Taranaki Menzshed was on the verge of closure in 2019, but now, thanks to a small, dedicated team, it is flourishing like never before.

"The Menzshed is fully functioning – to capacity, in fact – but when Phil reactivated his membership five years ago, it was on the verge of closing.

At the time, just four men were meeting twice weekly. Phil had taken a rain check to be a dad to Ivy, but when she was starting preschool, he had time to give.

"The call went out to the membership, whether the shed should go into recess and restart at a later date, which we all know is usually the end of things," Phil said.

The New Zealand Community Trust gave the Menzshed funding for the position, and Phil started coordinating at 10 paid hours per week. He and the members quickly got the shed back into a functional state, tidying up, organising the space, doing maintenance on machinery, and teaching people how to use machines safely and correctly."

Rolleston Men's Shed

First Aid

The Rolleston Men's Shed has a 3-page document available for Sheds, a PDF of "First Aid Procedures (non-injury)".

It lists recommended things to do when a Shed's member has a cardiac arrest or a similar event.

There is a recommended list of items that a Shed should have and a copy of the 3-page article is available to any Shed that wants a copy.

HUB Meeting

The Rolleston Shed hosted the first Canterbury region HUB meeting for 2025. 14 Sheds were present with 64 members. A poor weather forecast turned out to be a good day.



Woodwork

There are always chairs being repaired in the Woodwork section. Dining, lounge and anything else to sit on. Though not wood, woodwork lathes are used to make pens. A collection of bottle tops, number 2 plastic, has been made again. These are melted down and made into small bars and turned on a wood lathe to make pen bodies. The colours are mixed so each pen has an interesting streaky colour.

Advertising the Shed

The Shed now has a display at the local library, in a glass case, with items that have been made at the Shed. Another way the Shed is advertised is a article in the local free monthly newspaper. It will include a picture of something the Shed has done. From this we get jobs to do and offers of "retired" tools.

Region Five News

Otago and Southland

E Hayes and Sons are an iconic Invercargill store which has been a cornerstone of the Southland community since 1932.



But their story goes back a lot further than that!

The journey began in 1851 when Ernest Hayes was born in Warwickshire, England. After completing a five-year apprenticeship as a millwright and engineer, Ernest, his wife Hannah and infant son Llewellyn, immigrated to New Zealand.

Initially working as an engineer in Central Otago, Ernest soon embarked on a venture of his own. In the late 1800s, he founded the Hayes Engineering Works in Oturehua.

It was here that Ernest's inventive genius led to the creation of a series of groundbreaking farm implements, many of which are still in use today, both in New Zealand and around the world.

His first major invention was the Pollard Rabbit-poison Cutter, followed by the iconic Hayes Permanent Wire Strainer and the Parallel Jaw Wire Strainer. These innovations marked the beginning of a legacy.

This was truly a "Do-It-Yourself" era, and the success of Hayes Engineering was driven in part by Ernest's wife, Hannah. She courageously rode her bicycle across the harsh landscapes of the Maniototo Plains and Mackenzie Country to personally sell these inventions to local farmers.

In the early 1900s, Hayes Engineering Works built the largest windmill in Australasia to power their factory. Standing 18 meters tall with 6.5-meter sails, the windmill was constructed lying down before being raised into place. To this day, no one in the family knows exactly how it was achieved — perhaps an intriguing project for a future MenzShed?

The business continued to grow, and by the 1930s, Irving Hayes, one of Ernest's ten children, moved his own family to Invercargill, where he founded E Hayes and Sons as general hardware merchants in 1932.

They rented premises in Leven Street from the Railways Department for the modest sum of 28 shillings and 6 pence per week — about \$2.85 in today's money. Remarkably, the rent stayed the same for the next 24 years, unlike today's rental market!

In 1956, E Hayes and Sons began expanding the business, firstly by constructing a brand-new building at 168 Dee Street. Further growth followed into two adjacent buildings in 1977 and 2011, increasing the retail space to more than 6000 square meters.

Today, E Hayes and Sons is a fourth-generation family business, servicing industries, trade customers, and the general public across a wide range of retail categories.

These include hardware, paint, homeware, giftware, outdoor power equipment, and apparel. The business also features an on-site Columbus Coffee Cafe.

With a dedicated team, many of whom have a long-standing history with the company, E Hayes is proud to be affiliated with Hammer Hardware and the TradeZone Industrial Group. This allows them to cater to both the specialist industrial market and home users.

But there's more.

While E Hayes retail range alone is probably more than enough to excite our MenzShed members - there is much, much more to discover in this remarkable store.

The Hayes family's passion for innovation and motor racing is on full display at the store. Over the years, family members have each amassed an impressive collection of over 200 classic, vintage, and modern motorcycles, automobiles, engines, and unique memorabilia. Known as the E Hayes Motorworks Collection, this eclectic assortment is displayed throughout every department in the store, adding to its unique charm.

A highlight of the collection is the legendary 1920 Indian Motorcycle, which was modified and ridden by Burt Munro to set his historic speed record at the Bonneville Salt Flats in 1967. Burt's story was immortalized in the 2005 film 'The World's Fastest Indian'. The Hayes family's close friendship with Burt Munro until his passing in 1978 has led to a rich collection of his personal racing memorabilia, which is also proudly displayed.
