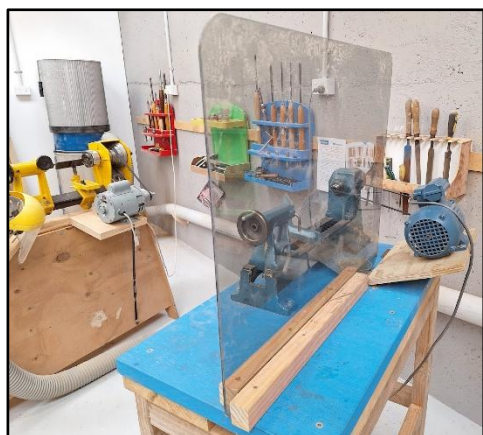
Around the Shed

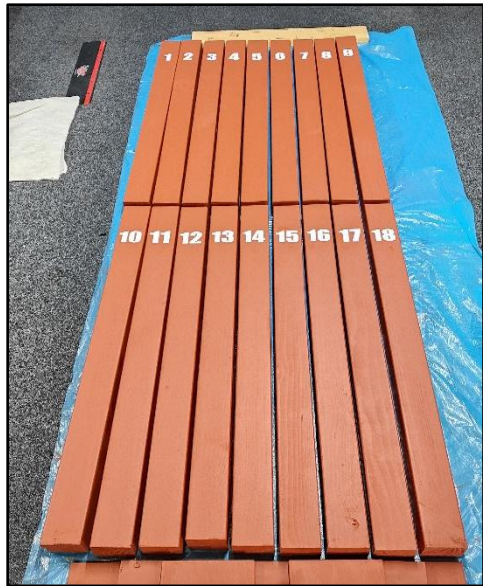

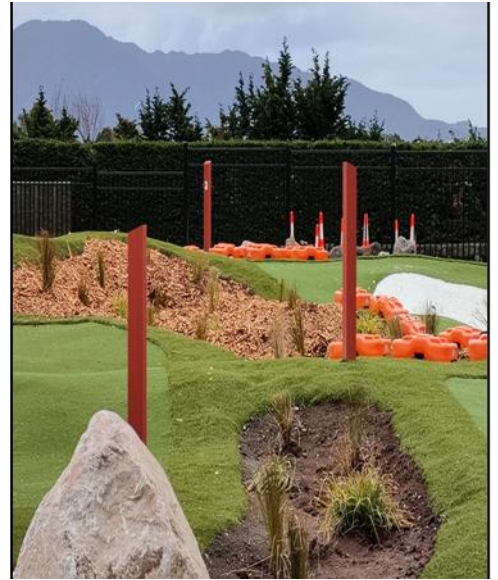

Building a Pataka Kai (a Street Pantry)

Chad W, (shed member), asked if we could build a Pataka Kai, and gave us some photos of one built somewhere in Raumati. These street pantries are intended to share surplus food, to donate food to those in need and generally provide community services.

I took the job on and together with Jim W and Ken A, we worked out how to do it from supplied photos and put it together.

It had to be strong, waterproof, vermin and insect proof, and as far as possible, vandal resistant, it had insect proof net screens in the door openings.

The foundations were H4 treated 200x50, the plywood was exterior quality and the fixings all stainless steel or galvanized.

I am grateful to those members of the shed who came up to us and suggested what we were building.

28 members said a coffin,
1 said a communal coffin,
5 said a long drop
and 1 said a sentry box.

You can see what vivid imaginations shed members have!

Here are some pictures of the finished pantry in its final position. It is yet to have metal angles driven into the ground as support.

I must go back and put a Menzshed label on it.

Construction details are stored on the Menzshed cloud.

My Broken Electric Drill - By Roger C

I dropped it onto a concrete floor; it broke the casing and even though the drill would work, it was useless - I couldn't put any pressure on it. It's only about 30 years old De WALT model and I like it, probably because I'm used to it. Also, I have two extra-large heavy duty nickel cadmium batteries for it. A new equivalent drill would cost about NZ\$600.

I went on the De WALT web site, but they did not have any spare parts. I would never have found what I needed in NZ.

So, I looked on the Internet for the same model, on eBay I found one at US\$350 plus postage US\$120 which was somewhat expensive!!

But I did find a second-hand drill shell at US\$18 plus US\$50 postage - about NZ\$120. A shell is just the case where the motor etc fits. I ordered this and received it within a week. I changed over shells in about half an hour, and my drill is now back to normal.

One tip - if you are undertaking a new, to you, repair job do take some photos of the dismantling process so you have a reference when reassembling.

If this happened before the Internet I couldn't possibly have repaired the drill. I would have had to telephone dealers and who would probably not even have the information on my old drill. With the Internet I could search the world for my drill code and see what's out there. Before I started searching, I didn't even know that there were such things as drill shells.

I even used YouTube to show me how to change over the shells, another use of the Internet!

A tip when you have been using a Credit Card abroad – By Roger C

I looked at my bank statement the other day and discovered that someone had taken approximately \$7,000 from my credit card account! I know Penny uses the same account. but she would be the last person to spend that much. Later, I found another \$7,000 had gone.

I could see the transactions were from Europcar, an international car hire firm that I had used when we went to the UK last year – but I had already paid them! I later received two emails from Europcar, one a credit note and one a tax invoice both in the GBP amount of my previous car hire.

So, I was in a situation where I didn't know if this was a scam or some 'legitimate' transaction error. Was I actually dealing with Europcar or some scammer pretending to be Europcar.

I immediately replied to the email saying 'this is wrong' and got an automated reply saying they would respond asap. Very frustrating!

Despite their email details looking legitimate, (I had carefully checked every letter in their email address), I decided to contact them via their web page which was obviously legitimate and used the complaints procedure therein to reiterate my complaint.

I also contacted my bank to stop the payments, but they said, 'Deal with the sender and see if you can resolve it' and they also sent me their '**Debit or Credit Card Dispute Online Form**' which I filled in. I should point out that I had not told the bank I was in the UK so they shouldn't have let the transactions go through - previously they had contacted me about suspicious transactions on my card from countries I had not visited!

I also stopped my credit card. - My bank issued a new one 7 days later with a new number.

Next day I got an email from Europcar saying this was happening because they were correcting an error on their system, (very suspicious), but subsequently I noted an additional entry on my account, this time a credit for \$7,000. But I was still \$7,000 short!

Emailed them again and this time got an immediate response saying they will check and would I please send them a copy of my statement. Half an hour later one of the negative \$7,000 disappeared. They had obviously been able to withdraw the item even though I had stopped the Card.

As you see, all was eventually sorted but it caused me quite some heartache. I made \$12 on the transactions due to foreign currency fluctuations!

When you come home from an overseas trip stop your credit card and get a new one from the bank. This will stop any transactions on your old card.

1963

In Britain and around the world people mourned the death of Winston Churchill. The Beatles received MBE's in the Queen's Birthday Honours list which prompted several earlier recipients to return theirs in disgust.

Closer to home, trans-Tasman jet flight commenced following the opening of Mangere Airport in December, and the Haast Pass road opened.

Roger Miller, the Seekers and Stevie Wonder came on to the music scene.

1967

1967 saw the first use of microwave cookers, the world's first cash dispensing machine and the first human heart transplant by Dr Christiaan Barnard.

In March the super tanker Torrey Canyon ran aground off Lands End in the English Channel with disastrous consequences for sea life and beaches. June saw the Six-Day War in which Israel defeated its Arab neighbours.

On December 17 Australian Prime Minister Harold Holt went for a swim and was never seen again.

In New Zealand 1967 saw two significant changes to the way we live – the beginning of decimal currency and the end of six o'clock closing.

It was the "Summer of Love" in San Francisco; the Festival of Flower Children was held at Woburn Abbey In England; "Hair" opened on Broadway and the Beatles produced music and albums with titles like: [Strawberry Fields For Ever](#), [Sgt Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band](#) and [Magical Mystery Tour](#). The Rolling Stones were arrested and later jailed for drug offences. Jimi Hendrix set his guitar alight on stage.

On 10th April the Wellington region was hit by a ferocious storm leading to the almost unbelievable capsizing of the two-year-old Inter-Island ferry, Wahine resulting in the loss of 51 lives.

During 1968 the additional "clip-on" lanes were added to the Auckland Harbour Bridge and Coastlands Mall opened.

On 27th September the musical "Hair" opened in London with 13 of its cast appearing nude.

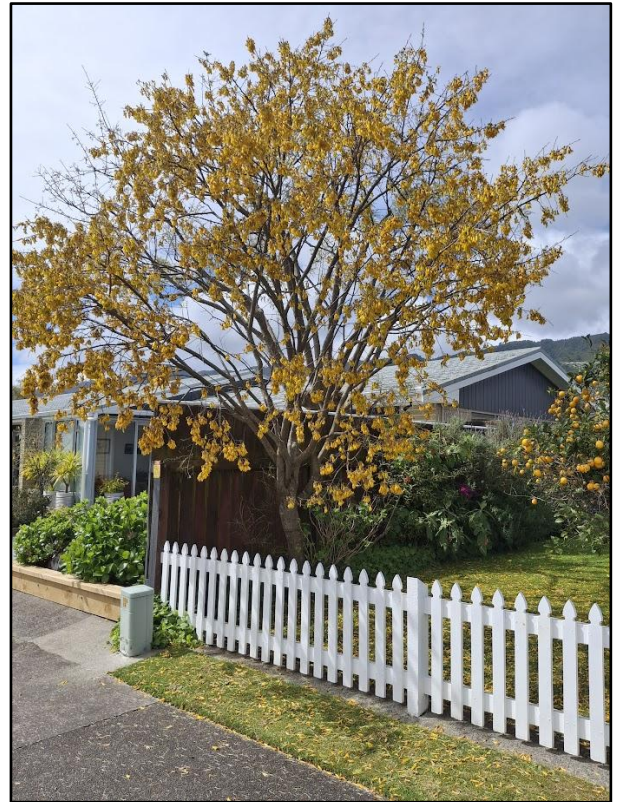

Battery Recycling - A few basic rules

Probably most of us want to recycle batteries and the shed has a place, just inside the Workshop, where they can be recycled. But it is not just a question of dropping them in there, there have to be some rules for safety.

Basically, some batteries are potential fire bombs, particularly lithium and cell batteries. [Here](#) is a video of cell phone batteries catching fire.

Usually, the problem is that the battery has been damaged or exposed to excessive heat but it can also be caused by shorting between the battery terminals.

In normal use batteries are perfectly safe but when jumbled in a box of other metallic batteries there is a danger that one or more batteries can link together and short out a battery. I know you only throw away the dead ones but even dead one can enough in them to cause a momentary spark if the terminals are connected.

This is what the roll of sticky paper is for, if put across the terminals it prevents this shorting.

It's not likely, but when put in a box with lots of other batteries and subsequently tipped into a skip of thousands of batteries the danger is magnified.

Alan C's's notes on battery recycling at the shed.

It's great to see the Menzshed Battery Recycling cabinet being so well used. Last time I emptied it, I could hardly carry the $\frac{3}{4}$ full plastic bucket. Sadly, this load was Rejected at the Waikanae Library which acts as a collecting point for the KCDC recycler.

The service can only cope with:

Cylindrical eg "torch" batteries size AAA up to size D

Button batteries, like size CR032 and smaller, and Only if they are Taped both sides to prevent shorting

The service Cannot cope with:

Rectangular 6V batteries (like Eveready Lantern battery, Duracell 6V, Dolphin 6V, etc etc) They don't fit in the cabinet hole anyway, cunning design

Power tool batteries of any kind

Batteries of Any type that are leaking (a big H&S issue with the collecting libraries and recyclers)

So, if you want this excellent service to survive, what can You do to help?

Please DON'T give us:

1. LEAKING BATTERIES OF ANY SORT
2. POWER TOOL BATTERIES OF ANY SORT
3. BUTTON BATTERIES THAT ARE NOT TAPED TO STOP THEM FROM MINGLING AND SHORTING

Please do:

1. UNDERSTAND AND FOLLOW THE BROCHURE ON THE CABINET

The sorting and taping has to happen at your end. Please don't dump non-complying batteries in the cabinet, leaving them for "someone else" to sort. If that continues to happen, we will have to can the service.

PS: After speaking to the KCDC Waste Minimisation people and checking out the Otaihangā and Otaki Transfer Station web sites, it looks like they do not accept leaking batteries. But I will continue enquiries as ideas occur to me.

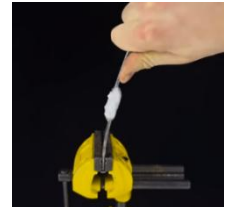

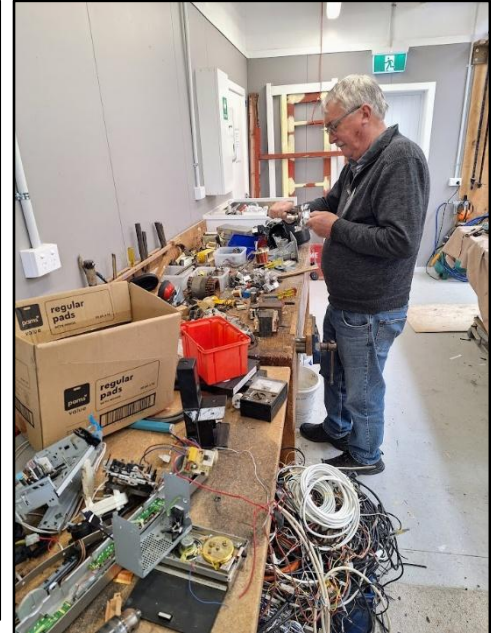
