From the Chair

Thanks to all who attended the 6 monthly briefing (General meeting) on the 18 April. For those of you who could not attend here are the main points.

- We moved some containers around the site to help form a barrier in order to reduce noise emissions for our neighbours from our firewood production.
- The contents of the containers are now organised a lot better, and we have a good idea (and records!) of what's in them.
- Peter Harkness has resigned as Treasurer and was thanked for his time in the role. The role has been picked up and shared between Peter R and John M
- The site tidy up is a work in progress. The back corner is not a jungle any longer and the timber along the fence is being sorted.
- More basecourse will be brought in in the coming weeks in an effort to prevent pooling in the car park area in front of the MenzShed Centre.
- We now have a comprehensive chart of accounts with costs set against budgets. While our accounts show a small shortfall in our income v expenditure the committee continues to monitor and manage this. There has been a general increase in costs across the board particularly in Insurance and Resource Consent application costs.
- We continue to enjoy a positive partnership with the Woodworkers Guild. We are appreciative of their \$5.000 contribution to our Resource Consent application. The application seeks to vary the current hours the MenzShed Centre can be used so it can be made available for other community groups in the evenings. This is progressing albeit slowly through the KCDC resource consent process.
- A new larger air compressor is installed and work on piping for air around the workshop is underway.
- The rear mobility access to the MenzShed Centre is almost complete. We expect code compliance sign-off will be done very soon.

We had always intended to erect a pole structure where the firewood-team work, and even had Resource Consent, (RC), to do it. Part of the RC was that we had to do a noise test which we had done and it told us, the firewood team were making too much noise, (not from chattering!), and we had to do something about it. The advice we got to solve the problem, was that we needed solid high barriers between us and the adjoining neighbour's properties. We were not in a position to build the proposed pole structure, so we came up with the idea of enclosing the firewood team on three sides with containers.

This we did as you see above and has turned out to be very successful. We intend to put protective roofs on the containers and maybe span the gap over the firewood team. The idea of the pole structure has not gone away but it has moved a bit further down the road.

The mechanical part of the clock had been removed for servicing, (grease and oil change no doubt!). Some panels were cracked and needed cleaning. The job has its challenges!





The Annual Kapiti-Wellington Bike Ride

27th March 2024

MenzShed Kapiti's intrepid cycling group meets every Wednesday (rain or shine, more or less) and generally alternates between a trip south to Paekākāriki or north to Otaki. However, during autumn, this regularity is broken by the Waikanae to Pipitea (i.e. the Railway Station) ride – about 55 – 65 kms depending on where each rider starts from. Early morning start at the uncivilised time of 7:30 am.



Planning is essential as there are quite a few hazards and the route can vary significantly depending on how much progress Councils have made on their cycleways. Our objectives are to keep off the road wherever possible, account for everyone enroute, provide "re-fuelling and de-fuelling" stops and ensure that any up-coming hazards are explained.

This year we had 12 riders, 10 from the Shed (Tony A, Noel T, Roger K, Alf C, Jim F, Ken G, Cliff D, Peter H & Craig S, Mark K, Graeme J and John M).

Clearly learning from last year, all batteries were well-charged, and all made it to Wellington with reserve power. It also turned out to be a very fast trip (average speed just under 22 K/hr). A few wilder riders may have come close to the local speed limit on the way into Paekākāriki! Just a rumour. No witnesses.

Tony A's usually careful route planning failed along the Porirua Cycleway. In previous trips, this cycleway was under construction, parts not fully connected and involved quite a bit of on-road travel. Now, it is possible to avoid the road from Porirua to Takapu Road by using the eastern side of the Porirua Stream and using marked lanes on a couple of quiet Tawa roads. It seems reading the cycleway signs (plenty of them) is still a developing skill for some of our number, and asking advice from non-cycling bystanders is like asking for a winning lotto ticket.

The two challenging sections include the Paekākāriki /Pukerua Bay and the Johnsonville/ Ngauranga Gorge pathways. Each section is narrow, often strewn with rocks and other debris and making mistakes could have terminal consequences.

You get a different perspective of our roads when cycling: litter, poor surface quality, lack of protection from traffic (the vacuum from a B-Train at 90Km/hr is no gentle breeze). Happily, everyone navigated these sections successfully despite one of our number leaving the cycleway to confront uphill Ngauranga Gorge traffic head-on. This may not end well, I thought, but no, the Gods smiled: he is still with us today and his dog is happier for it.

We managed to make a "stop/go" operator literally "hopping mad" when we passed through a Glenside Road section – having been given priority. Apparently, the kind soul at our end failed to tell his coworker at the other end that he had given the group right of way. No animals were harmed!

The trip ended at the Railway Station at 11:27 – a great ride and quick enough considering our frequent stops. The final challenge was to get more bikes than the rules allow on the Waikanae train. Thanks to the Metro Guards all went well. The trip next year should be perfect.



Get Checked for Prostate Cancer, (PC)

We had a talk given by Bill Guthrie from the Prostate Cancer Foundation of New Zealand. He was very entertaining and during the process of the talk several men owned up to having had PC. He gave us good advice the main points from this were:

- Have a medical at least once a year, you owe it to yourself and your family. Make sure your doctor does a **PSA** blood test for PC
- If your PSA rating comes back at above 6 and your doctor does not do anything about it get a second opinion.
- When you are going for your results make sure someone comes with you. It's well known that if the results are bad, and the doctor says the word Cancer, you probably won't hear or understand the next ten minutes of his message whilst you process 'cancer happening to me'. Your friend will be able to explain the rest of the diagnosis.
- If you get the bad news **do** contact the Foundation, they are very experienced and will give you good advice. They understand what you are going through,

SYMPTOMS

More options are available if prostate cancer is detected before it causes symptoms, so a GP visit for a check at least once a year is vital. If symptoms are present, they may include:

- · Peeing more often or trouble starting and stopping
- · Waking more often at night to pee
- · Poor flow, dribbling, pain or burning when peeing
- · Blood in pee or semen

The PSA Test

A simple blood test that measures the level of Prostate Specific Antigen in the blood. Increased levels are a possible indicator of prostate cancer.

The DRE Test

Your prostate is an internal organ your doctor cannot see. It can only be felt by a finger inserted into the rectum, enabling your doctor to estimate areas of abnormality.


