


A job well done with a quality finish which the family are extremely happy with.




- Rebuilt tray –Gordon rebuilt this and Barry acted as the model!

Safety

The Committee is keen to maintain our safety record and the safety standard that Menzshed Kapiti has established.

If you are in doubt about how to use any equipment or how to do anything there are a number of people who are happy to help or guide you.

On the contrary do not be offended if someone taps you on the shoulder and suggests a safer way of doing things. We are keen to ensure you are able to enjoy our facilities without damage to yourself or others.

And for those who do get 'bitten' by something then the first aid equipment is on the Safety Trolley.

Safety Trolley

The Safety Trolley is fitted with the following;

Fire – 5 extinguishers and a fire blanket

Protection – plastic and heavy duty gloves

Goggles and safety glasses

Earmuffs (level 5) and ear plugs

First aid- band aids in the box on the top left of the trolley

First Aid box for more extensive injuries

Blanket and pillow

Survival blanket

And Chad has volunteered to fundraise for a defibrillator

Already several members have had training in the use of defibrillators so we just need the equipment.

Our target is \$ 2,900 and to date we have raised over \$1,100 through Trade me sales, garage sales and the sale of other items.
